

Giles is looking at a date in October for the next Texas Hold-Em poker night.

Olds reported the accounts with Columbia Credit Union have been updated with the correct signers.

A motion was carried to send, as budgeted, \$1500.00 each to the CC Sight/ Hearing and \$650.00 for scholarship recipient.

Harding reminded the board of the club retreat on September 13th. Scott suggested we use an on-line survey process called, "Survey Monkey".

Limoges announced the Melvin Jones nomination committee has narrowed down the

finalists and will be sending out ballots to those eligible to vote. The banquet committee is deciding on a date before they can secure a location. H. Sutfin will follow-up.

H. Sutfin asked for school supplies to donate to the Washington Elem. Back pack program.

K. Milligan announced the new roster will be completed by August 15th.

Scott asked about setting the club website up with pay-pal capabilities to accept payments for concert tickets, fruit sales, etc. She will check into the cost and report back.

T. Sutfin asked Olds to send an updated letter of intent to the ZC, DG, VDG and MD19 announcing his desire to run for the office of First Vice District Governor, for the Lion year 2009-2010.

H. Sutfin announced all of the projects at Washington Elementary have been reassigned with new chairs and assistants to take over for them eventually.

D. Rawson reported the joint Sight/Hearing BBQ meeting was attended by about 30 people.

Limoges announced he sent out the ballots for the Melvin Jones candidates and said we need a chair for the auction committee.

Scott reported she will work with Rhyasen to send out the survey for the upcoming club retreat on September 13th.

Rhyasen announced T. Sutfin will be running for the office of First Vice District Governor and will be

receiving the zone's endorsement at the zone meeting on the 19th.

H. Sutfin reported she received a written request from the Washington Elementary PTA for \$750.00, but feels they have some issues that need to be resolved before we can commit to anything.

Rhyasen reported Armstrong will conduct the August 22nd luncheon meeting in his absence.

Rhyasen ended the meeting by announcing the next board meeting will be Friday, September 5th, 2008.
