
Happy New Year to All

As I write this letter the weather outside is frightful! One of those rainy,

windy days is upon us.

We Fort Vancouver Lions have had a very busy and productive six months. Some of the activities have been service projects like: back to school ice cream treats for the students at Washington Elementary School (WES); providing a meal to students and their families at the Curriculum Fair at WES in September; serving Thanksgiving dinner at WES; hearing screening at several elementary schools; Walk and Knock food drive (135 tons of food and counting; \$10,000 in cash donations; with 3,500 community volunteers participating, including many of our FV Lions); Bell Ringing for the Salvation Army; providing shopping day for the students at WES at our Santa Store; Share House preparation and serving of food to the homeless every third Wednesday; and projects various Lions Centennial (donation to help with the dedication of a new flag pole for Fort Vancouver National Park - provided 100 boxes of crayons to Bridge the Gap for foster children - collected 100 can openers for FISH - purchased a Lion statue for WSSB which will be dedicated at WSSB Track and Field in May); donations to LCIF for disaster relief following Hurricanes Harvey and Irma; and a donation to buy sunglasses and billed caps for the children in Lambayeque, Peru.

Our fundraisers so far this year have been quite ambitious. The fruit sales of fresh and frozen fruits were very successful. Other projects were: providing staff to run concession booths at the MODA Center; Cash Payback Day at Warehouse 23; the production and sale of snow people at two bazaars to bene





In celebration of the Lions Club International Centennial, the Fort Vancouver Lions donated a bronze Lion statue to the Washington State School for the Blind (WSSB). Working with WSSB Superintendent Scott McCullum, our Centennial Committee learned the Lion is the official mascot of WSSB and there are currently no Lion statues on campus.

Last October the Board of Directors approved funds to purchase a bronze lion statue to be donated to WSSB. The lion was delivered on December 18. Pictured below is Len Leger checking out the newly uncrated lion statue. WSSB Facility Manager Rob Tracy is drawing up plans for a base for the statue. According to Superintendent McCullum, the

statue will be officially unveiled during the WSSB Track Meet in May 2018. Installation plans include lighting and signage in print and Braille identifying the WSSB Lion as a Centennial gift to commemorate 100 years of Lionism. The Centennial Committee includes Ralph Harding (Chair), Len Leger, David Rich and Bill Shalaby.



**Lions Eyeglass Mission to Peru** 

A group of Lions including Fort Vancouver Lions David Rich, Penny Rich and Lee Denny along with Milwaukie Lion PID Dennis Tichenor traveled to Lambayeque, Peru in November as a combined FACES (cleft palate assessments/surgery) and a Lions Eyeglass Mission.



The Lions transported over 3,000 pair of glasses provided by the Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center (LERC). These glasses were given to the Lions clubs of Lambayeque, Peru.

Lions David, Penny and Dennis have formed many close partners with the Lambayeque Lions Clubs over the past several years and It was a pleasure to have Lee be a part of the team this year.

During our stay we helped the Peruvian Lions with four vision campaigns at two schools (Yencala Boggiano, E La Purisima Lambayeque) one hospital (Hospital Belen of Lambayeque) and one community center (Association Puerto Eten) and provided glasses to hundreds of adults that needed them. The local Lions will continue to do vison campaigns over the next year with the glasses that we have left with them.

One of the things that we have been doing over the past several visits is working to teach the young school children about the need to protect their eyes from the sun that is damaging their eyes and causing a disease called Pterygium (Ter-RIDGE-ee-um). During this trip we provided, through a grant from the Fort Vancouver Lions club, 500 UV children's sunglasses and ball caps that were distributed, after an educational program, by the local Lions at schools. It is our hope that this simple act will start the process of educating the young children of Peru of the importance of protecting their eyes.

Pterygium is primarily caused by exposure to the sun's Ultra-Violet rays. People most likely to develop pterygium live near the equator and/or at high altitudes, AND they spend most of their daylight hours outdoor - especially as children. (In Peru, 60%-80% of the people over 50 have pterygium.)

There is no actual cure for this disease, but it can be lessened by wearing a simple pair of non-Rx sun glasses, and a brimmed hat or ball cap, to shield their eyes from the sun's ultra-violet light, are the most cost-effective ways to prevent or slow this non-cancerous eye growth.

Glasses don't have to be dark, just offer UV protection - e.g. clear poly-carbon glasses (Rx or not) - but they should be large enough to protect the eye from reflected sunlight that could reach the eye from around the edges of the glasses. Clear glasses have the advantage of being worn all the time indoors and outdoors (even on cloudy days when sun glasses are not needed to keep a person from squinting - clouds do not stop UV radiation.

Pterygium usually grows slowly over decades before it begins to seriously impact vision. Often, it is first visible in early to mid-adulthood, although unseen damage at the cellular level probably began years earlier - in childhood. Over time, pterygium can cause astigmatism (which distorts vision). This in turn can lead to severe vision loss and even blindness and the pterygium continues to grow toward the center of the eye.

Since few people in the world (especially the poor) can afford an operation (or even have access to an eye doctor), eye protection from the sun's UV light is the only viable solution. AND, ongoing education is the vehicle needed to raise

awareness of the need to protect eyes from UV damage.

# **Lambayeque Eyeglass Clinic**

The Lambayeque and Amazon regions of Peru represent high poverty and most families lack health insurance as well as access to reliable health services. Many children do not receive proper medical treatment. Our (Lions clubs of Oregon and Washington) connection to the Lambayeque Lions, which is a small town outside of the larger norther city of Chiclayo, has been instrumental over the past six years in helping us help them, to serve those in need in remote Peruvian villages.

The Lions Clubs in Oregon, Washington and Peru have started to put in place local sustainable solutions that can be replicated. To help in this case the city of Lambayeque has given the local Lions Clubs a piece of property on which to build a clinic. This clinic will be used to screen the targeted population and provide them with needed glasses. The Peruvian Lions will use this facility to conduct regularly scheduled eyeglass clinics to help with current vision problems and will be combined with instruction at eye-health fairs on how to preserve the vision of future generations, and slow the progression of Pterygium (Ter-RIDGE-ee-um) in those whose eyes are already damaged. The themes are simple and universal: "Protect your sight, block sunlight." "Wear sunglasses and a brimmed hat to block the sun." "Take care of your eyes and your eyes will take care of you."

The approximate cost of this clinic is \$100,000. When applied for, Lions Clubs International will provide, a grant of \$100,000 USD. Because Peru is an emerging nation the normal 50% match for this grant has been reduced to 25% which means that the Peruvian Lions and their friends will have to raise \$25,000 USD for this to become a reality.Our hope is that, with your support, we will help them reach this goal. # Fort Vancouver Lions Board Meeting Friday, November 17, 2017, 10:30 am

King Lion Chriss Denny called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m.

**Board Members Present:** Lions Chriss Denny, Doug Wilson, Gay Enyeart, Steve Seymour, David Rich, Eva Halter, Phyllis Goldhammer, Len Leger, Jen Leger, Lee Denny, Rick Giles, and Tony Licata. Members present: Terry Robertson, Bill Shalaby, and Steve Staudinger. A quorum was present.

**Minutes:** The minutes from Friday, October 20, 2017 were presented. Len made a motion to approve the minutes. Steve Seymour seconded the motion. The minutes were approved unanimously.

**Treasurer's Report:** Gay presented the balances for the accounts (Foundation as of 11/17 \$10,862 and Admin bank \$3962), presenting the treasurer's report for October. There was a short discussion of the aging list.

### **Proposals for Board Consideration:**

1. **1718-18.** To approve a motion to send \$410 to Camp Leo to support tuition for a needy camper in elementary school? The camper fees for Camp Leo were submitted, as we requested, by David Glen, Director. They were as follows: High School (grades 10-12 - \$680)

Junior High (grades 8-9 - \$630 Middle School (grades 6-7) \$580 Elementary (grades 3-5) \$410

Elementary (grades 3-5) \$410 Rick made the motion, Len seconded, the motion passed unanimously.

- 2. **1718-19** To approve the waiver of a new member's first year dues. David Rich, Membership Chair has requested that the board consider paying the first years' (\$75 or as amended) dues for new members as a recruitment tool. To ensure that our new members have some skin in the game they will be required to pay the new member fee of \$35. If, after a year, they do not want to continue as members then we have, as a club, failed in our indoctrination and/or quest to prove to them through our many service programs that service to the community and "our Serve" motto is worth continuing. The proposal would be grandfathered for new members inducted this 2017-18 Lions year. After some discussion, Len moves, no second. Issue is tabled. It was suggested that future discussion should explore incentives for FY18/19. There was a brief discussion of need for dues remission for those who have a hardship.
- 3. **1718-20.** To continue reimbursal of \$10/event/person up to \$75 for dues, annually to continue indefinitely while the MODA center fundraiser continues. Gay defined motion, Len made motion, Eva second. After brief discussion, the motion passed with two abstentions.
- 4. **1718-21**. To approve \$100 to the Free Clinic of SW Washington as its Charity of the Month donation. Len moved, Rick second. Passed unanimously.

### **Board Members – Free Exchange of Information**

- 1. **Membership** -- There was a general discussion of membership, including orientation, attendance at meetings.
- 2. **Club Rosters** Rosters will be distributed to members in attendance who have not received a copy. Others will be mailed.
- 3. **Walk and Knock** Our club will help with coffee and water at 'Bag Folding' at the Clark County Food Bank on Nov. 18) Food barrels will be delivered and monitored as organized by Lee Denny, Chair (Nov. 20) Steve and Shelley Staudinger will be Area Captains on the Walk and Knock food pick up day (Dec. 2) as before (we are looking for replacement Captains, as they will not be available next year.)
  - 4. No Noon Meeting November 24 Thanksgiving weekend.
- 5. **Christmas Dinner** Our Christmas dinner will be on Friday, December 1, 6:00, at Club Green Meadows. There will be no noon meeting that day. There will be special recognition for Ken Service for his 50-years as a Lion.
  - 6. **3-month Calendar –** discussion of the 3-month calendar.
