TURNING ADVERSITY INTO SERVICE

Who's Who in Fort Vancouver Lions Club

Sometimes life throws us unplanned curves. I

have grown to realize that the challenges in my life have been the ones that have given me strength and hope. It's a process that one must go through. Have you ever noticed that when stressful situations crop up the tendency is to dwell on the negative? As time passes the negative reaches a fork in the road. Either the memory softens or resentment grows. Usually the challenges in my life have been the lessons that have helped others. What kind of memories do you have?

Journey with me, as I share the amazing life chapters that God has outlined for me. Every challenge

has been used to help others.

My grandmother was the constant in my life. Her favorite saying was, "Dixie, give an honest day's work for a fair days wage." When my grandmother could no longer care for me, my parents took over.

In my early teen years my parents drove me to the city; threw my suitcase out on the curb and me afterwards. My mother's parting words were, "Good riddance to bad rubbish." That was the last time my mother spoke to me. Street life was hard. I remember crouching beside the garbage bins in a city alley, hoping I would not be a rat's next meal; and that I would wake up alive the next morning.

On my eighteenth birthday, my father found me, and 'enlisted' me in the Army. After I was sworn in my father turned to me and said, "Now you will never be an embarrassment to the family again. Have a good life." Little did he know that Army life was exactly what I needed. It gave me food, shelter, clothing, community and family. Later, benefits would include a college education.

Years later those experiences would be used to serve God by helping others.

When my 31-year marriage ended, leaving 12-year old Angéla and me standing alone, my faith would be tested.

God had a plan. In 1989 Children's Home Society developed a Treatment Foster Care Program. They needed caregivers and homes. They took a chance and licensed me (for four teens) as a single parent caregiver. These girls had to be involved in two systems to qualify for the program. First was the mental health system, others were Juvenile Justice, Family Court, Drug and Alcohol programs. 71-teens passed through the doors. Challenges turned into Blessings. God worked miracles. He used my early life experiences to understand and help them.

There are so many stories I could share, however one stands out. We'll call her Michelle. She was a thirteen year old prostitute. Michelle had no boundaries. Rules meant nothing to her. We had simple house rules: a dollar a door slam, twenty five cents for any word that offended any other member of the household, etc. When the money jar reached \$50.00 the teen with the least amount of offences got it. Two weeks into the program, Michelle received her allowance. She handed me a five dollar bill and said, "Let me know when I use it up." That behavior sums up our relationship. Although the program was designed as a ninety day reunification plan, Michelle exceeded her time. She had nowhere to go. At age sixteen she aged out of the treatment program and was placed in main-line foster care. Years passed. One day my phone rang, "Mom, this is Michelle. Remember me (How could I ever forget?)? I'm calling to let you know I made it."

My question was, "And what does that mean to you?"

She answered, "Well, I married a good man. I'm a good Mom. I keep a clean house. I go to church twice on Sunday and once on Wednesday." What a glowing testimony. BUT, then she had to add, "And, I spend a lot of money at the mall."

I asked, "What line of work are you in?"

"I'm a stay-at-home mom," she replied.

"Where do you get all the money you spend at the mall?"

There was a pause and she answered, well, my husband can't keep his mouth shut so I charge him a dollar a word."

In 1996 Charlie and I were married. He became licensed for foster care. Sadly five years into the marriage he became very ill. In the early 2000's we closed the doors on foster care. He passed away in 2011.It would be the veteran's organization that supported me in this time of grief. However, along life's journey I had completed my BS and MS in Criminology; a four year degree from the Children's Institute of Literature and finished up the courses in the mental health field to become a licensed registered counselor. This education was used to create the Embrace Success (ES) Counseling Services. It inspired me to write programs for families dealing with various issues. These have been taught throughout the school systems, as well as in other areas.

2005 brought the most challenging event yet. Returning home from dinner one evening, I listened to this message on the answering machine. "Mom, this is Rob. The Army chaplains just left and you know what that means." Indeed I did. It meant that my grandson, Timothy, had been killed in Iraq. How does one deal with the loss of a child? I kept asking God, "How can I heal? What do You want me to do?" Nagging thoughts persisted. <Dixie, think about it. You are a Veteran who understands military life. You are a Mother/Grandmother. You are a counselor. Pick yourself up. Do something to help these combat veterans and their families.>

In 2006 Healing on the Homefront was established. This service is designed to help families dealing with reunification. It offers counselling, resources and peer support. Desert Storm, Iraq, Afghanistan and Vietnam veterans have utilized the services. This is an on-going program. Today, the program includes reaching out to the homeless veterans (who are still fighting the war).

The Veteran community embraced me. I was able to heal.

God is still chartering my life. He sent Jerry, a fellow veteran, into it. Jerry has taught me to slow down and enjoy life. We volunteer on an excursion train, travel and enjoy playing cards. Best of all, he invited me to attend a Lion's Club Meeting. Life is coming full circle, I help volunteer at a local elementary school from time to time. My Fort Vancouver Lion's Club hosts a Santa Store, Literacy Program and fun family events. We are busy with the sight and hearing programs.

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2019 marks my 80th year. God outlined the many chapters of my life. All I had to do was fill in the

blanks. I can hardly wait to see what adventure awaits me.

David Rich My life as a Lion

I first got involved with a Lions Club when I was living I California around 1980 when I was 35ish. Through playing softball, a group of guys started running around together and called ourselves "The Fearsome Foursome" and when our wives were with us, we were the "Crazy Eights". One of our Fearsome Foursome group had been asked to go to a Lions club meeting and decided to join so naturally he shared that with us and in a matter of weeks we were all members of the Suisun Valley Lions Club. I admit I was in the club for quite a while until I figured out what the Lions club actually did and really started to get involved. This was my first Lions club presidency.

I was a funds administrator at Mare Island Naval Shipyard in Vallejo, CA. In 1987 I was recruited into a three-year Executive Development Program with the Naval Sea Systems Command in Washington, DC. Due to the rigorous training and travel schedule I did not have time for extracurricular activities so rejoining

a Lions club was not an option.

In 1994 I transferred to the Joint Logistics Systems Center, Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, OH where I retired in 1996. When we moved to Ohio, I once again had the time and joined the Beavercreek Lions Club. This is where I became a Lion club president for the second time and then went on to become District 13-J Governor for the 2001-2002 Lion year.

Upon completion of my District Governor year, our oldest son asked us to come to Oregon and purchase a business (Reitmeier Mechanical) with him; so in July of 2002 we moved to Beaverton, OR. Upon arrival I started to look for a local club and found the Beaverton Lions Club. During my 14 years with this club I was president twice and was also elected and served as Council Chair of MD-36 in 2007-2008. I also unsuccessfully ran for International Director in 2010 but lost to a very good Lion Sunny Pulley.

We downsized and moved to Vancouver in 2016 and joined the Fort Vancouver Lions Club and proudly served my fifth times as a Lions club president during the 2018-2019 Lions year.
