Lions Serving our Community Even During A PandemicFort Vancouver Lions have been volunteering at the Clark County Food Bank by harvesting food at the Heritage Farm Community Garden on 78th Street in Hazel Dell, Vancouver this year. We have also helped the food bank by gleaning unsold food at the Farmers mar-

ket downtown Vancouver and transporting it to the Food Bank.

The Heritage Farm has a rich history that dates back nearly 150 years to the 1870s, when Clark County started operating a poor farm along

the south side of Northeast 78th Street, once called 'poor farm road" in Hazel Dell. The site was later used as a research and experimental farm by Washington State University Extension before the county resumed

managing the property in 2008.

This year the farm has produced over 100,000 pounds of fresh vegetables and fruit for the Clark County Food Bank. The volunteers that harvest the produce from the farm are managed by a Vista volunteer. Since the cold weather started last week the volunteers have been doing clean up chores to prepare for next

This has been a service project that has been both rewarding and a great community service to the Food Bank to fight hunger in Clark County. This year with Covid-19 restraints on service projects, working out in the fresh air has been a perfect way to serve our community.





Yard Cleanup Project

Like an outtake from Beauty and the Beast, a dozen club members and several special guests hoisting rakes, shovels, mowers, clippers, loppers and a variety of other weed whacking weapons rallied to clean up an elderly ladies' yard over a 2-day period this past month. The owner of the property had lost her husband five years ago and many areas of the yard and flower beds had fallen into disrepair. No blackberry, ivy, weed, or long grass was safe from our gallant efforts. COVID restrictions were followed and it was great for members to be together in person, providing community service. Pulliam Peace Pole Dedication

On Saturday October 3, 2020 a group of Fort Vancouver Lions and friends gathered at the Washington State School for the Blind to witness the dedication of the Pulliam Peace Pole. On a cool, overcast, fall day, WSSB Superintendent Scott McCallum told the gathering the dedication had been scheduled to be held during the WSSB/Fort Vancouver Lions Track Meet on May 14, 2020 but had to be rescheduled due to Covid-19.

The Pulliam Peace Pole is dedicated to both Lori and Roy Pulliam to recognize and honor their service to WSSB over the past 40 years. The

pole is 6 sided with each side containing two languages with the phrase "May Peace Prevail on Earth". It is written in 12 languages representative of the school including Braille, sign, and three native American languages. Scott explained that WSSB students and faculty decided which languages to include on the pole.

The pole is placed in the center of campus near Ned's Shed, the gazebo where the track meet usually starts.

The pole is mounted in a wheel chair accessible cement path and nicely landscaped. It makes a beautiful addition to the campus.

Fort Vancouver Lions Club add their appreciation to Roy and Lori Pulliam for their years of service to the community and our club. We



Butte Creek Scout Ranch

I want to share some more information about **Butte Creek Scout Ranch** since so many Lions have asked to hear more about the camp.

Butte Creek is located on 670 acres near Scotts Mills, Oregon just south of Molalla. The camp was purchased in 1968 with a plan to expand camping opportunities for Cub Scouts ages 7-10. But this plan was put on hold until the 1980's when our **fellow Lion Ron Nielsen** was a member of the Cascade Pacific Council's Advisory Board.

When I met Ron here in the Ft. Vancouver Lions Club, he was excited to share his proud memories working on the plans for Butte Creek. The picture above shows the camp



The activities boys and girls get to do there still include horseback riding, roping, fishing, gold panning and visiting all the animals on the ranch. In addition to housing Cub Scout camping, the property is an award-winning Clackamas County Tree Farm. And plans are underway to harness the waterpower of Butte Creek itself to provide hydropower which will add sustainability in the future. Boy Scouts of America places great emphasis on Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM) programing for Scouts of all ages thru real-world STEM projects like the hydropower project.

Last month the camp was threatened by the Beachie Creek fire on

one side and the Riverside fire on the other. Thankfully, the buildings pictured above, the herd of 70 horses and the rangers who live on site are all safe! Sadly, all but one of the 11 Scout campsites was burned to the ground. Fundraising is underway to restore the burned campsites. You can learn more at

Standard Reports to the Board:

Secretary's Report: A motion was made by Craig Limoges, seconded by Doug Wilson and approved to accept the minutes from the August 14th Board meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Rick Giles gave the Treasurer's Report on the Administrative and Foundation accounts. Rick will be reporting balances on the calendar month instead of the time period between Board meetings. Treasurer's Report will stand as presented pending observation.

Lions Sight Foundation of Clark County Zoom Meeting Minutes October 6, 2020

6:30: Meeting called to order by Jeff Fish

Attending: Jeff Fish, Bill Lundin, Ralph Harding, David Page, Susan Nellor Harry Barrett, Stephanie Starke O'Dell, and Casey O'Dell.

September minutes: Jeff asked for a motion to accept the September minutes. David Page made the motion, Ralph Harding made the second. No opposed, minutes accepted.

Treasurers report: Checking account September balance \$6,500. Orchards Evergreen donation of \$500.00. New total \$7,072.00. Vouchers paid \$625.00. Ending checking account \$6,447.00 28 pending vouchers estimated at \$3,200.00. Endowments, investments and savings account balance of \$50,176. \$520 of interest since January 2020.

- Jeff Fish began the meeting by explaining that during the summer months due to the closures of partner clinics and health issues with several board members, just the Executive Board met.
- Old Business: "Give More 24", a Salmon Creek Lions Club on line fund raising event in partnership with the Community Foundation of Southwest Washington raised \$4,200.00. Thank you Salmon Creek.
- There was a revisit of the discussion of changing the qualifications of applicants. The areas involved were: Residency, Citizenship, and adding a ethnicity section for statistical tracking. After a lengthy discussion, the topic was tabled for another meeting.
- Jeff Fish said he was working on the letter to the Price Foundation explaining how our Foundation has used their award. A copy of that letter has been placed in the Secretary files.

New Business: Susan Nellor reported that she submitted a grant request for \$17,000 to the Clark County Realty Foundation. The closing date was October 15, 2020. No results, yet.

Patient Care Coordinator report: David Page sent out an email detailing the activity. It has been included in the Secretary's file. The concern of using outdated application forms was brought up. David reported on one solution, he has been in contact with all referring agencies to destroy outdated paper application forms and to switch to our electronic version.

To encourage electronic filing it was proposed that applications mailed in using outdated paper forms will be returned to sender accompanied by a letter explaining how to access the preferred on line method. Jeff asked for a motion to approve this change. Bill Lundin made that motion, Susan made the second. David said he would create the letter to accompany the request to file on line. Bill said there were already 15 paper vouchers that need this letter. Postage reimbursement will be available.

David Page updated us on the success of his data base protecting us from paying for application violations. Ralph Harding volunteered to continue transferring paper applications to the on line system to ensure accuracy of David's data base.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

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
