The Santa Store Recap



What a wonderful success our Santa Store was this year! It was expanded a bit by adding a new coat for each student at Washington Elementary School along with a new quilt for each family. We were able to carefully comply with COVID restrictions: each volunteer was screened the day before with a phone call to ask the COVID health questions, temperatures were taken on site, everyone wore gloves and a mask while gifts for each student and their family members were selected, sorted, and bagged together for each household. The completed bags were then transported back to the school where they began a one-week quarantine period. Finally, the bags were handed out to families—again, carefully adhering to COVID safety guidelines.

Washington Elementary School gave the gift packages out on December 17th. We were able to provide 390 coats and 240 quilts and blankets in addition to the gifts from the Santa Store.

Project Linus donated 140 double fleece blankets.

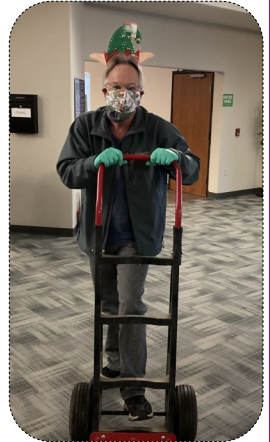
Greater Clark County donated \$1000 for coats.

Board Members Present: Queen Lion Gay, Helen Sutfin, Jennifer Denny, Bill Shalaby, Allen Rhyasen, Martha Johnson, Craig Limoges, Eva Halter, Rick Giles, Doug Wilson, and Shelly Brown. A quorum was present.

Standard Reports to the Board:

Secretary's Report: A motion was made by Lion Helen, seconded by Lion Craig to approve the minutes from the October 16, 2020 Board Meeting as presented.

Treasurers Report: Rick Giles presented the Treasurer's Report he had sent out. There were a few questions about the Santa Store budget that Rick answered. Treasurer's Report will stand as presented pending observation.

Old Business:

20-21.2 Update on Club Rejuvenation Pilot Project/ Member Orientation Queen Lion Gay reminded the Board that the whole Board is part of the Membership Committee. Lion Craig discussed the progress of this process. He discussed that our club needs to be thinking of new projects and that we should all participate in growing our club. Lions Sight Committee Of Clark County Zoom Minutes December 1, 2020

Attending: Jeff Fish, Bill Lundin, David Page, Ralph Harding, Susan Nellor, Stephanie O'Dell, Casey O'Dell, Harry Barrett, Lisette Romig, guest Pacific University.

Meeting called to order at 6:30 by Jeff Fish.

Jeff deviated from traditional meeting format and invited Lisette Romig to present first. Lisette Romig updated us about the Screening scheduled for December 16, 2020. Everything is in place for a successful screening event. Jeff Fish and David Page will be on site representing the Sight Committee. Ralph Harding has scheduled eight appointments, and one more as a backup. Sight Committee will distribute processed eyeglasses upon receipt from Pacific University Eye Clinic.

Approval of November minutes: Jeff asked for a motion to approve the minutes as written. David Page made the motion, Bill Lundin seconded. Voted on and motion passed. Minutes were accepted as presented.

Treasurers report: Ralph Harding announced donations of \$375.00 from Fort Vancouver Lions Club, \$1500.00 for Salmon Creek Lions Club and \$1,000 from Camas Lions Club. Adding this amount of \$2875.00 to checking account resulted in a new balance of \$13,480. Expenses were vouchers paid out totaling \$1,4945 and \$38.00 was paid for services rendered to Dotty Scott of Premium Websites. (The Sight Committee currently has a credit balance with Premium Websites) There were 27 outstanding vouchers totaling \$3,105. The Endowment stands at \$65,310. Ralph can provide a hard copy of November Treasurers report upon request. Jeff asked for a motion to approve Treasurers report as presented. David Page made the motion, Susan Nellor seconded. Voted on and motion passed. Report was accepted as presented. Note: Ralph Harding filed the 2019-2020 fiscal year short form income taxes.

Patient Care Coordinator report: PCC Ralph processed 26 applications. 18 were approved. Two clients will be seen by Pacific University Screening Unit. Six were denied: two too soon, two non-resident issues, one had insurance and one deemed to have sufficient funds to purchase their own glasses. David Page is continuing to update the patient data base. Jeff urged all in attendance to keep searching for a permanent PCC. Ralph will send out a job description to aid the search.

Old Business: Stephanie O'Dell made a second presentation about Zenni Optical. Please refer to her email of 10-21-20 (attached to minutes) highlighting the success of the Peninsula Specialty Interest Lions Club in California. Peninsula has partnered with Zenni Optical to coordinate a no cost eyeglass voucher program that all Lions Clubs in the United States can participate in.

Stephanie will do further research on what the local Lion Zenni coordinator job would look like. How complicated will this "order taking" process be? And, lastly how important it is to know the pupillary distance when ordering glasses through Zenni. David Page and Susan Nellor shared their positive experiences with the Zenni ordering process. Thank you Stephanie for reminding us of this alternative method of providing eyeglass assistance.

New Business: Jeff Fish reported on his no success experiment talking with Stanton Eyewear and several other low cost alternative eyeglass businesses. He will revisit this experiment after the Holidays. Casey O'Dell offered the information that the Evergreen School District has a Medical Magnet program which might be a source of a Patient Care Coordinator. Due to Covid restriction, this program is currently in Zoom classes and their building is closed to the public. Casey volunteered to do more research later in 2021, when and if in-person meetings can take place.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:30.

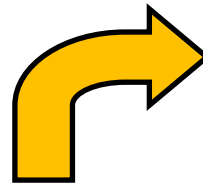
