

Being in the Red Was Unacceptable

The Santa Store ended up in the red for 2020. We spent almost \$300 more than we had. To correct this deficit Michele Drushel, Gay Enyeart and Eva Halter decided to have a garage sale on January 16th.

We advertised in the Columbian and had signs up. The weather cooperated, it was cold but sunny. The merchandise included baby furniture, decorator mirrors and pictures, Lenox China and Gorham crystal Nativity sets, Fitz and Floyd serving wear and lots of great books. A lot of the donations came from Joanne and Katie Zimmer, former Fort Vancouver Lions.

When all was said and done we cleared \$355. That means we are officially in the black for the Santa Store Budget and we have a start on the fundraising for 2021.













RECYLING EYEGLASSES

One of the core mission of our organization is to help the less fortunate of this world in the area of sight. We are in a unique position as Vancouver area Lions to accomplish this task. Vancouver, Washington is one of fourteen satellite locations in Multiple District 19 for the Northwest Lions Eyeglass Center (NW LERC) housed in Lacey Washington. These satellite locations gather used glasses from many different drop-off locations throughout their areas. Current collection locations include grocery stores, optometrists' offices, medical centers, senior citizen centers, libraries and banks to name a few. Ten clubs from Clark County and two clubs from Skamania County gather the glasses that are stored until there is enough glasses to send up to NW LERC. Prior to the access restrictions that have been imposed on the Port of Vancouver where the collected glasses had been stored, an eyeglass sorting party would be conducted. Glasses were sorted into four boxes, Multiple vision, Single vision, Sunglasses and Unusable metal and plastic frames. Soft eyeglass cases were also recycled. The only items not recycled were loose lenses and hard cases. An agreement was made with the Longview Satellite to now send all the collected but unsorted glasses from the Vancouver satellite to their satellite location where they regular conduct sorting parties. They have a team of dedication Lions who on a regular basis meet and sort the glasses. After the glasses are properly sorted, they are shipped to NW LERC. The Vancouver Satellite, on average, sends around 15,000 pairs of glasses to NW LERC. Recently, in two sperate trips, a total of around 18,000 glasses were sent.

NW LERC goes thru a process of determining which glasses will be suitable to be reused. On average only about 10% of all glasses collected pass the test for reuse. Once the glasses are accepted as usable, they are cleaned and measured by a lensometer and categorized. These glasses are then used on various mission in less developed nations. A complete description of what goes on at NW LERC can be found on their website, lionsnwlerc.org.

In summary, because of the efforts of Lions around the Vancouver area, we continue our mission to help the less fortunate in this world.

Environmental Project: The Fort Vancouver Lions are a team for the Clark County WasteBusters Challenge!

WasteBusters is an annual waste reduction competition for organizations and individuals in Clark County hosted by the Green Neighbors program. The Fort Vancouver Lions Club will sign up as a team committing to reduce waste and foster sustainable habits for the 21-day challenge between February 22 through March 15. The challenge provides opportunities to attend virtual events, complete weekly challenges, and answer prompts to share ideas with the community!

Once registration is open, Doug Wilson will sign up the Fort Vancouver Lions for the Clark County WasteBusters Challenge and invite the club to join. Everyone signed up will receive a reminder email when it is time to kickoff the challenge. After the challenge begins, we can monitor the WasteBusters website. The WasteBusters site has its own social media platform where you can respond to the prompts, post challenge updates, interact with the community and learn about waste reduction. Watch for posts from the WasteBusters team page on the Challenge Dashboard to be prompted to reduce waste and earn points.

Team members earn points by attending virtual events, completing weekly challenges and answering prompts. Participants who earn over a certain number of points are entered into a drawing for a grand prize.

Who's Who in Fort Vancouver Lions Club

I am the oldest of seven children (5 girls and 2 boys) and have lived in the Pacific Northwest my entire life. I have two grown sons and one 4-year-old granddaughter, Ayen. She likes to meet my friends so don't be surprised if she pops in during one of the Zoom meetings to say hi.

In 1956 we moved from North Bonneville to Stevenson, Washington. Both sets of grandparents lived there and the property my dad built our home on was just up the hill from his mom's, my Grandma Evelyn. We were excited to have woods to play in, a creek to wade and catch salamanders in, and about being able to sneak down the hill through the tall grass to eat ground cherries and strawberries out of my grandmother's garden. She also had plum, apple, pear, and cherry trees we got to pick the fruit off the trees whenever we wanted.

Both of my grandmothers had owned restaurants and it wasn't unusual for me to stand next to them on a chair, with my apron on, learning to cook. Grandma Evelyn taught me to knit and crochet also. Now my granddaughter stands next to me on a chair, learning to measure flour, etc. Before COVID, recreational activities included hiking with my youngest sister, jewelry making with another friend, and wine tasting with my exercise buddies. I look forward to a time when all those things are doable again. Meanwhile, Ayen and I "garden" in the back yard. I pull weeds, she digs up worms, names them, and builds them "mud castles" to live in.

One of the first skills my mom taught me was ironing. I started on handkerchiefs and pillowcases, then moved on to my dad's shirts. When I was good enough, she brought me with her to help iron for a mother of 9 with bad varicose veins in her legs. This was my first volunteer job and I loved that I could help someone else. Mom always said, "If you can, you should help. You may not have money, but you have your hands and time, put them to good use."

Dad would chop wood and do other odd jobs for older neighbors to help them. He always said it was important to help those that needed it. I'll never forget the visit when he was just getting home from cleaning gutters for the "old people", dad was 81 at the time.

My first job (other than babysitting) was at Jantzen. I started in the file department and then

moved into Sales Service. While there I worked with the men's military division and then transferred into the misses' division, working first with the smaller stores and then with the major department store chains from across the United States.

I left Jantzen in 1987 and began working for a property management firm in Vancouver. I was there until February of 2017, when I retired. I worked in several areas of the company and when I retired was the payroll and benefits administrator.

While working for the property management firm, I decided to go to massage school. I graduated March 17, 2001, just before I turned 50. Massage was my "fun" job. Since I didn't make my living doing massage, I could donate a lot of my time to charity fundraisers, one of them being the Veteran's Court Board. I ended up volunteering at sev-

eral of their events which is how I met Eva Halter, whom you all know is responsible for my joining the Lions Club.

I love honoring the values parents instilled in me and can't think of a better organization or group of people to accomplish that with than the Lions.

Meeting called to order at 6:30 by Jeff Fish.

Jeff deviated from traditional meeting format to invite Jamy Borbidge to report on the December 16, 2020 Screening event. Jamy informed us the event went off without a hitch. Seven patients were screened, six were prescribed glasses and one patient was referred on to a special eye clinic. 4th year students practiced skills from helping patients select frames to crafting the lenses. All the lenses and frames were donated. The finished eyeglasses will be sent to David Page and distributed to the patients. The next screening event will be held on April 7th, same location time at the WSSB. Jamy thanked Jeff and David for their on site presence on December 16 as well as praising Ralph's extra efforts to call each of the clients to remind them of their appointment time and for arranging a last minute fill in patient. She suggested that the reminder phone calls be made again for the April 7 event.

Approval of December minutes: Jeff Fish asked for a motion to approved the minutes as presented. Ralph Harding made the motion, Harry Barrett and David Page seconded. The minutes were approved.

Treasurers Report: The December ending checking account balance was \$11,872. Ralph Harding announced a \$1,000 donation from the La Center Lions Club which raised the ending balance to \$12,872.

20 vouchers totaling \$2,275 were paid. The ending balance at the time of the January meeting is \$10,597.

31 vouchers were not redeemed. If they were to be redeemed the cost would be \$3,534.00. Jeff Fish asked for a motion to approve the Treasurers report. David Page so moved. Bill Lundin seconded the motion. Ralph's report was accepted as presented.

The Endowment has a balance of \$65,000; combined total of checking and endowment is \$76,066. \$813.68 of interest earned thru December.

Patient Care Coordinator Report: Ralph Harding processed 33 applications; 6 were denied: 4 because of sufficient funds, 1 was too soon and 1 was a non- Clark County resident. 27 vouchers were approved and have been sent out.

Old Business: Jeff Fish is continuing to market the Marshall Tucker electric guitar. Bill Lundin may have a lead to facilitate its sale. Ralph Harding is finishing up the PCC job description so that position can be effectively marketed. The goal continues to be to find a new PCC or at the least an assistant for Ralph. No other old business.

New Business: No new business was brought up.

Good of the Order: Salmon Creek Lions Club is sponsoring a Shredding event on Saturday, January 30, 2021 from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. in the Salmon Creek Chucks parking lot. Money donations will be gladly accepted.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:10.

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


