

## **Fort Vancouver Lions in The Columbian**

Volunteers collect donations for Clark County Food Bank

Clark County residents adapted quickly in December when the annual Walk & Knock food drive was reimagined as Drive & Drop for the pandemic era, and on Saturday a group of volunteers decided to see if that community enthusiasm could fuel a second round of donations for the Clark County Food Bank.

December's Drive & Drop brought in more than 134,000 pounds of food and an exceptionally large round of cash donations, according to the nonprofit's website, but the new format was not able to fully match the usual Walk & Knock intake – 2020's food tonnage was a little more than half of what the drive collected in 2019. Craig Limoges of the Fort Vancouver Lions Club said the club's leadership hoped that a new food drive following the same model might be able to make up some of the difference. A supplemental drive in March had never been done before, so he said the club kept it relatively small-scale, treating it as a sort of experiment to see how the community would respond to an early spring event.

"It's a learning experience," he said.

Saturday's standalone event didn't use the title Drive & Drop, although it followed a similar collection setup in the parking lot of the Living Hope Church on Northeast Andresen Boulevard, focusing on non-perishable food and cash donations.

Most of the volunteers were from the Lions Club or members of Boy Scout Troop 358, which meets at the Vancouver Church in Hazel Dell. The scouting group is heavily involved in food drive efforts – the troop's assistant scoutmaster, Adam Hegewald, is also the vice president of operations at the Walk & Knock nonprofit.

The Drive & Drop model proved to be especially popular with seniors, Hegewald said, because the pandemic has severely curtailed their ability to visit public places and participate in community events. A high proportion of Drive & Drop donors were above the age of 50, he said, and the same pattern appeared to be happening on Saturday.

"It's been great for those folks," he said.

Later in the day, Limoges said donor traffic had started out slow but picked up throughout the morning, and the drive pulled in an estimated 2,000 pounds of food by the end of the day.

Saturday's event was planned as a one-off, but Hegewald said the Lions and Scouts could end up planning follow-ups or establishing a new recurring event depending on the kind of response the first attempt garners a strong response.

"I could see this happening maybe once a quarter or even semi-annually," he said.

The challenge would be to avoid bumping up against other regular food drives, he added, because the group doesn't want to "muddy the waters" and siphon away participation from other events like the annual Letter Carriers' "Stamp Out Hunger" food drive in May.

The need for food support is at an all-time high due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In the Clark County Food Bank's 2020 Annual Report, president Alan Hamilton wrote that "we've never seen demand like the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic brought our way" – although he also noted that the bank brought in more food than ever, in part because "food drives sprung up everywhere."

In another example of a new impromptu food drive, the Vancouver Sunrise Rotary Club announced Wednesday that it has teamed up with the owners of Kafiex Roasters in downtown Vancouver to set up a donation drop-off site at the coffee shop on the weekend of March 20.

The timing is intended to coincide with the return of the Vancouver Farmers Market that same weekend. The market sets up along Esther Street between West Sixth Street and West Eight Street. Kafiex is located at the upper end of that block, at 720 Esther Street.

## Who's Who in Fort Vancouver Lions Club

helping others, and this is another opportunity to do so.

In addition to being a member of FVLC, I am currently the Treasurer for the Columbia Cascade chapter of Friendship Force International and also a member-at-large for the Retirement Association of Portland State University (of which I am a hiking club member). I have come to appreciate Zoom meetings as no longer have to drive to meeting locations, fight traffic, or find parking.

## Lions Council Meeting March 16, 2021

Facilitator Jack Johnson, Salmon Creek Lions President, called the meeting to order at 6:30pm.

Lion Jack clarified the Zone Chair comments from the February Lions Council Meeting minutes. He has offered to be Zone Chair for the coming Lion year if no one else is willing to accept the position; if there will be a person responsible for communications; and a back-up person for times when he is unable to be in charge.

Lion Jack had asked that in preparation for the March meeting club officers name club members who could be potential Zone Chair candidates. He received no information on potential Zone Chairs.

Why is it important to report service hours to LCI? When other organizations such as the Gates Foundation or the Carter Foundation are considering partnering with a service group to develop a project such as the measles initiative in Central Africa, they want to know what the service organization does and how accountable it is; that information is in the service reports posted at LCI. It also helps district leaders plan projects and share service ideas among clubs. We can emphasize service reporting at a future Lions Council. Club reports:

Fort Vancouver sponsored a drive by food drive, learned several things about organizing another one, and considered it a success for a first event. They will hold a shredding event at the United Methodist Church May 22.

Hazel Dell has continued its support of the community outreach center at Hazel Dell Elementary School. Several members have donated blood or platelets.

Salmon Creek has held no new events since February. They are planning a clean-up at Pleasant Valley Community Park in conjunction with the Water Shed Council. They are also planning a trash pick-up along 117th Street. They will hold a shred event May 22 to benefit the Free Clinic. Their annual flower sale information is on their web site.

Cascadia Lions are working on individual personalized graduation cards for all 700+ seniors. They will hold a bike rodeo this summer.

Vancouver Dawn will work with the City of Vancouver on environmental projects. Their Crystal Plum Bazaar is on track for November 13, 2021.

She asked if everyone was willing to promote clubs working together.

Lion Alan Ryasen said that Fort Vancouver is holding another Pulliam Pizza Party. They have elected next year's officers, four of whom are members who have not previously held club office.

PDG Mark reported that because of the continuing border closure due to COVID the North West Lions Leadership Institute will be for the U.S. portion of MD19 only. It will be in Post Falls, Idaho. Currently Lions Casey, Stephanie, and Leslie are planning to attend.

2nd VDG Debbie said that she had sent Lion Jack the list of potential G-2 Zone Chairs that she made last year.

1st VDG Marilyn said there is a SWOT Analysis meeting via Zoom Saturday morning to discuss goals for next year. Pioneer Lions are selling Kettle Corn at the Safeway on Old Ocean Beach Highway on Saturdays. Lion Helen announced that the G-2 Spring Conference will be virtual on Friday, May 7th. She encouraged clubs to share 3 minutes talks about a project from this year. Saturday's events will be in person. Registration form will be available soon.

Lion Alan Ryasen will chair the April 20, 2021 Zoom meeting. Meeting adjourned at 7:32pm.





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
