

What does the word SERVICE mean? We hear a lot about service in our Lions Club settings, but do we really know the meaning of service? The motto of Lions Club International is WE SERVE, what, where, who, how do we serve? I have been pondering these questions recently, and here are some of my thoughts.

Service is a simple idea that really has a variety of meanings. It's what we hope to get when we enter a restaurant, grocery store or gas station. It's what we give when we join Lions Club. The Dictionary defines service as "the action of helping or doing work for another". A couple of simple thoughts about this definition come to mind.

First, service is an action, it is not simply knowing about a need – although that is the beginning of service – it is doing something for the benefit of another or others. It seems to me that service requires us to be aware and alert to the needs of others. It is easy for me to go through the routine of my day and be very aware and involved in my own needs, but I'm not always aware of the needs of others, and when I am aware of the needs of others, I may be "too busy" to do anything about it.

Second, service is an action that doesn't discriminate. Every person we encounter in our life has needs.

Some may be our family or best friends, and others may be someone we have never seen or met before. Certainly, there are those we meet that have overwhelming needs, but there is always something we can do to lessen the load.

Service really is quite simple. It can be a smile or a "hello" on the sidewalk, it can be a very simple act of kindness; holding the door open, picking up something another has dropped, etc.

In the coming months, Fort Vancouver Lions Club has a number of what we call "Service Projects." You will find details about them in the monthly newsletters. Let's commit ourselves to "the action of helping or doing work for another" as a Fort Vancouver Lion!

Herbed Shrimp Appetizer

- 3/4 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup lime juice

1/3 cup diced sweet red pepper

1/3 cup diced sweet onion

- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 4 teaspoons minced chives

2 teaspoons minced fresh tarragon

2 teaspoons snipped fresh dill

1-1/2 pounds cooked large shrimp, peeled and deveined

Nasturtiums, calendula, rosemary, dill sprigs and flat leaf parsley (optional garnish) **Directions:**

In a large bowl, combine the first eight ingredients. Place the shrimp in a large resealable plastic bag; add herb mixture. Seal bag and toss to coat. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours. With a slotted spoon, transfer shrimp to a serving bowl. Garnish with flowers and herbs.

Lions Sight Foundation of Clark County ZOOM Minutes August 3, 2021

Meeting called to order at 6:38 by President Jeff Fish

Attending: Jeff Fish, Stephanie O'Dell, Ralph Harding, Susan Nellor, David Page and Bill Lundin.

Jeff Fish called for a motion to approve July minutes. David Page made the motion, seconded by Ralph Harding. Vote taken, motion passed.

Treasurers report: Ralph Harding reported beginning checkbook balance of \$10,852.

13 vouchers redeemed amounted to \$1,480. Ralph reported on the successful completion, after several months of his dedicated effort, in obtaining an ocular prosthesis for a qualified client. Our portion of the matching grant with NorthWest Lions Foundation was \$2,961.00. The ending balance was \$7,891.00.

Jeff asked for a motion to accept the Treasurers report as presented. David Page made the motion, seconded by Bill Lundin. A vote was taken and motion passed.

Endowment fund has a balance of \$66,282. This amount plus the ending balance of the checking account is \$74,173.

The following clubs have donated in the 2021-2022 year: Hazel Dell (\$3,000.00 and Fort Vancouver (\$800.00).

PCC report: 29 applications processed. 26 were approved. The three denials: one too soon and two non residents. One of the non residents was referred to Longview Sight Committee. One emergency voucher was approved via ZOOM.

Zeni PCC report. The inaugural Test Program Z report: Stephanie O'Dell successfully walked 3 applicants through the Zenni process in June and their glasses are on order. One client has not completed the process, waiting on frame selection.

No clients sent to Stephanie in July, Ralph will start diverting good fit clients to Stephanie in Auqust.

Old Business: A committee composed of Ralph Harding, David Page and Jeff Fish conducted a financial review of the 2020-2021 year. No irregularities were found.

The committee pronounced the Lions Sight Foundation of Clark County to be financially sound.

New Business: Three items were tabled for future discussion. One, there is an acknowledged need for a new logo for letterhead etc. but what it should be is still in the discussion stage. Two, a donation receipt would be helpful, but what it should look like is still in discussion stage. Three, it was agreed that a Facebook page would help the marketing of the Sight Foundation, but again details need to be worked out, especially who would administer the page and its content.

The September ZOOM Sight Foundation meeting has been changed from the first Tuesday to September 14, 2021, the second Tuesday. Labor Day conflict was the reason. The change was sent to all the Club Presidents and Secretaries on August 4, 2021. And a reminder will be sent out closer to September 7, 2021.

Meeting adjourned 8:10 p.m.

I have been a florist who specialized in wedding flowers for 20 years, a personal shopper for 10 years and a speaker with Lay Witness Missions for 30 years. My husband and I were foster parents and fostered 12 children before he passed away. I still wanted to help foster children so I went back to school and got my Master of Social Work Degree. I worked as a social worker at Innovative Services NW and The Institute for Family Development. Now I work for Community Family Services Foundation writing home studies for families who want to be foster parents. Those three organizations serve foster children in many different ways.

I joined Fort Vancouver Lions in 2013. I've been on the board for several years and was Club President



2019-2020. My volunteer life before Lions was serving our community through several nonprofit organizations. I was with Bridge the Gap (BTG), I served on the board for 13 years and was the CEO for 2 years. BTG helps foster children with extracurricular enhancing activities like sports, summer camps and music lessons. I have served on the board of Office Moms & Dads, an organization that helps foster children the first day the child comes into foster care. I also volunteer with Friends In Service to Humanity (FISH) and SHARE house to help the homeless of our community.

I joined Lions because I needed more distraction and something else to focus on because my mother was enduring the heartbreak of Alzheimer's disease and I was losing her a little bit each day. The supportive and welcoming Fort Vancouver Lions were like medicine to my soul. The projects were meaningful and were making a difference in the community. Whether I was calling Lions to volunteer for bell ringing for the Salvation Army or making 100 dresses that grow and raising money to buy 100 pair of shoes that grow

for children in Nicaragua or organizing the Santa Store for Washington Elementary School during a pandemic, the work always served a purpose to help others. I'm so grateful for my Lion family.
