Who's Who in Fort Vancouver Lions Club

I was born in Michigan and raised in Lansing. I grew up enjoying the four seasons, lakes, camping trips with my family and lots of great family and friends. I lived there until I finished college at Michigan State University. While in high school I worked at J.C. Penney in the catalog department and began volunteering at the Michigan School for the Blind in a classroom of teenage students with Deaf-Blindness. I really took to it and pursued a degree and teaching credentials at MSU. While in college I worked as a bank teller. In the summer before starting my master's program, I got a job at a different bank. This is when I met Roy, who worked at this bank. We hit it off right away and were guite inseparable. As part of my degree requirement I had to do an internship and it could be anywhere in the country that had a deaf-blind program. I had always wanted to see the Pacific Northwest, and Vancouver Washington had a school with a deaf-blind program. One of my professors had worked at WSSB and gave me contact info. The school provided a placement in a deafblind classroom with a wonderful teacher. I had free room and board in exchange for volunteering on evenings and weekends. (How lucky can a girl from the Midwest get?)

As I thought I would, I fell in love with the PNW! A college roommate lived in the Tri-Cities, and she and her husband showed me around quite a bit, she even loaned me her car for a while so I could explore the area. As luck would have it, I was offered a job at WSSB to begin in the fall (of 1982) and I accepted it. This was a potential problem as I had already fallen in love with the infamous Roy Pulliam, who was back home in Michigan toiling away at the bank. How would he take this news? As you know, Roy loved adventure, so he moved west with me and found a job in a Vancouver bank. We settled into



adulthood, got married, bought our first house, had our children. Within that time, my sister joined us in Vancouver and then eventually my parents Rodger and Marilyn retired and ioined us out here in Vancouver.

I have spent my time at WSSB doing what I love and becoming involved in many capacities at WSSB. I feel strongly about preparing students for adulthood and have spent years working to find work experiences and jobs in the community for our students and working with other agencies to allow for smooth transitions from school to higher education and/or work. Currently I work with young adults just out of high school in a 24/7 residential program to allow them to learn skills of adult independence. My joke with them is to tell them that they need to become taxpayers so they can

Along the way both Roy and my father joined the Ft. Vancouver Lions and were very active members. It was such a positive experience for them, and I was drawn to it after working many of the projects and

enjoying the fellowship, I eventually joined too. I

have not yet been near as active in the club as Roy or my father, but someday I will retire (hey this is only my 40th year at WSSB!) and vou'll see more of me.

Club Reports

They have a Shred Event scheduled for April 16 and flower basket sales for April 30. They have helped Afghan refugees and donated funds to the Wonderful Onesies project. Ridgefield: They are organizing Lion volunteers for the Ilani Brewfest. They try to have a presence at all community and school events. Their Christmas trees sales fund raiser was a great success. The Ridgefield Green Bag project has brought in 31,582 pounds of food and \$7,000. They have 30+ new members – club total now 104.

Hazel Dell: They are doing Green Bags, donating blood and/or platelets, partnering with school, and composting. They will do a re-designed breakfast at the Parade of Bands and will help at the Ilani Brewfest.

Fort Vancouver: They had a busy December. They are helping with volunteers at the Ilani Brewfest. Their upcoming Shred Event is April 30, 2022 on the Salvation Army property.

Camas: They will have new member orientation Saturday. Their new service project is the "Can Do Crew" which focuses on providing assistance to seniors. They participate in the community garden project. They provided funds for the Wonderful Onesies. They will be selling bulbs on line.

2nd VDG Leslie Chasse: The COG (Council of Governors) meeting is this weekend.

G-6 Zone Chair Casey O'Dell: All 5 G-6 clubs had representatives at the 2nd Zone meeting: 2 in person and 3 via Zoom.

GMT Stephanie O'Dell: Camas is planning the Fun Night for Spring Conference – "flannel up for fun." Ryan Morrison will run the photo booth.






