What Is a Service Club?

A **service club** or **service organization** is a voluntary nonprofit organization where members meet regularly to perform charitable works either by direct hands-on efforts or by raising money for other organizations. A service club is defined firstly by its service mission and secondly its membership benefits, such as social occasions, networking, and personal growth opportunities that encourage involvement. Many of today's service clubs got their start as social clubs for business networking, but quickly evolved into organizations devoted more to service than to networking, although networking may still be the primary reason many members decided to join. Historically, most service clubs consist of community-based groups that share the same name, goals, membership requirements, and meeting structure. Many of these clubs meet weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly on a recurring established day and time, commonly at a mealtime. Most of these clubs started with a single club in a single city, but then replicated themselves by organizing similar clubs in other communities. Many of the service club organizations have become worldwide movements, and have obtained official recognition by the United Nations and various governments as non-governmental organizations (NGO).

With 46,000 clubs and 1.35 million members, the Lions Club is the world's largest service club organization.

Fort Vancouver Lions Club & Foundation Board Meeting Friday, April 22, 2022 10:00 a.m. Via Zoom in the time of COVID-19

Queen Lion Cheri called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

Board Members Present: Queen Lion Cheri, Mike Cavanaugh, Martha Johnson, Michele Druschel, Allen Rhyasen, Gay Enyeart, Jennifer Denny, and Shelly Brown. A quorum was present.

Member Wins: Board members shared their wins for the previous week.

Standard Reports to the Board:

Secretary's Report: A motion was made by Lion Allen, seconded by Lion Gay to approve the March 18, 2022 Board Meeting minutes as presented. The motion was approved by the Board.

Treasurer's Report: Lion Rick sent out the financials for the month but was unable to join the meeting. Lion Cheri had the detailed information from him to share with the Board. Last month there were no new expenditures to pay out. Lion Rick sent \$2,500 to LCIF; \$1,000 from Lion Eva, \$500 from Lion Bill and the proceeds from the basketball event. Our club received a \$1,000 donation that was deposited into the Foundation Account. We had a deposit from Amazon of \$21.00 from the AmazonSmile program. Lion Cheri wants to have all of the books reviewed before the start of the new Lions year.

Lion Gay pointed out that the Foundation Balance Sheet needs to reflect the correct amount based on the numbers on the Profit & Loss section. She has emailed Lion Rick about this correction.

Lion Cheri asked Lion Gay to submit her receipts from paying for lunch for the past DG, current DG and spouse. The Treasurers Report stands pending observation.

OLD BUSINESS:

Credit Card Project: There was an email vote to make an upgrade to the credit card processing system for our club. This will make donating easier to our club, eliminate the need to have to move money from administration to foundation account, and streamlining the whole process. The motion passed with 9 yes votes, 1 no vote and 1 abstention. These accounts are being created and we are working with Dotty to update the website. Lion Cheri reports that an additional bonus to this is we are saving the club an additional \$200 per month. Thank you to Lion Dotty for keeping us aware of this expense.

Strawberry Sales: Lion Allen said that all the flyers are ready to be sent out that include the QR code. The goal is to sell 400 boxes. That would generate about \$10,000 to the club. There will be a phone tree to contact customers about a week before the end of the selling period. Lion Allen will be contacting Lions to participate in the phone tree. The pick-up date is Saturday, June 4th from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon.

Shred Event: Lion Allen said that one of the benefits of the credit card change is that people will be able to make donations by credit card at the Shred Event. We will also have a flyer for the Strawberry Sales to hand out with the QR code on it. This code can be scanned and will take customers directly to the page to buy strawberries. The Salvation Army people were able to secure a \$500 donation from Waste Management, the company who owns the shredding truck. The total amount from corporate sponsors is \$1,450. We will split the proceeds of this event with Salvation Army. This event will be held again in the fall in conjunction with the Salvation Army.

WSSB: I received a list of Lions who have completed the volunteer application process. We have a good number of people signed up to help. Lion Gay has the Macaroni & Potato salad scheduled to be delivered to the school. IQ Credit Union is providing the water bottles for the students. Lion Mike said he is working with Adrienne and the fire department to get an apparatus there for the kids to explore.

Meeting Location: The place where our club has been meeting is too small for the size of our club. Lion Rick is checking to see if we can have our May meetings at the Heathen. Lion Cheri has arranged to have our June meetings at Fiesta Bonita, near Vancouver Mall. They have a big room, along with good parking.

Game Night UPDATE: Lion Mike has offered a suggested change to the Game Night. Lion Cheri has a Board Room that would serve as a good space for this event. Lion Martha offered a suggestion that we let the host decide the location. Lion Allen suggested we could do a Happy Hour Friday on one of the Fridays. Other clubs are using their alternate Fridays to have service projects or social gatherings.

Officers List: Lion Cheri read the list of the officers that we currently have. Lion Gay suggested a change to our Policies & Procedures regarding the fact that we follow the LCI Constitutional Bylaws. She will write a statement

into the Policies & Procedures manual and send it to the Board. In order to meet the deadline for getting our slate of officers to MD19 on time, it was decided that we would send the slate of officers to the club through an email.

NEW BUSINESS

Existing Club Member Outreach: Lion Cheri inquired if our club has a phone tree to contact members. She will find out what other clubs are doing from a member outreach process and procedure standpoint. We need to make sure that we are taking care of our current members as well as looking to bring in new members.

MD19G Spring Conference: Lion Cheri reported that the Friday event that she and Lion Helen were participating in has been changed. Lion Cheri has the gift basket ready she made as a donation from our club.

Post COVID Party: Lion Cheri has suggested that we plan a time when we can get together to enjoy seeing each other again. Lion Gay suggested that the New Officers have been installed at Club Green Meadows. It is an amazing dinner of Prime Rib and Salmon, sides and desserts. We could also do it outside somewhere. This usually takes place before the Lion year begins in July. We need to ask someone to install the new officers.

Red Cross Project: It was decided by the Board that the project email sent from Tracey Fortmann be sent to the whole club.

Program Chair Replacement: With the Legers moving, there is a need for a Program Chair replacement. Lion Martha suggested that we ask Lion Phyllis to take over as the Chair of the Program Committee.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:17 a.m.




