I thought it might also be fun to take a look at several different types of love: 1- Eros is passionate love, and most akin to the modern construct of romantic love. In Greek myth, it is a form of madness brought about by one of Cupid's arrows.

2- Philia is the hallmark of friendship, and is shared goodwill. Aristotle believed that a person can bear goodwill to another for one of three reasons: that he is useful; that he is pleasant; and above all, that he is good, that is, rational and virtuous.

3- Agape ["aga-pay"] is universal love, such as the love for strangers, nature, or God. It does not depend on filiation or familiarity. Also called charity by Christian thinkers, agape can be said to encompass the modern concept of altruism, as defined as unselfish concern for the welfare of others.

4- Philautia is self-love, which can be healthy or unhealthy. Unhealthy self-love is akin to hubris. In Ancient Greece, people could be accused of hubris if they placed themselves above the gods, or, like certain modern pol-

iticians, above the greater good. Healthy self-love, on the other hand, is akin to self-esteem, which is our cognitive and, above all, emotional appraisal of our own worth. More than that, it is the matrix through which we think, feel, and act, and reflects on our relation to ourselves, to others, and to the world.

Our Lions club is a great PICTURE of LOVE- caring for each other and caring for our community. This month, as you help Cupid with his job and wrap your arms around those you care for- remember to take a long look in the mirror- and send a warm huge to someone this Lion Club loves VERY MUCH! THANK YOU for all you do!

**Washington Elementary SANTA STORE
Where do we go from here**

As reported in the last newsletter, the Santa Store was held Dec. 15. Twenty-six volunteers (FVLC members, iTECH students and BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB counselors and community members) performed 176 hours of service.

The inventory has been packed away; volunteers have experienced 'good feelings' regarding the time spent helping students shop for family members.

During this year's initial planning, committee members agreed that it was time to take a close look at this historic project. The pandemic presented a challenge that affected the stores' operation.

The past 2 years, with the school closed, PZC Eva and her 'elves' were able to continue to send sacks of Christmas gifts home with students.

The left-over items were packed away and no inventory replacement took place. This year's inventory was limited.

In due diligence the Store Committee is reviewing the holiday experience at Washington Elementary.

What went well? What could be better? How do faculty members see the store? Do they have ideas for change? Volunteers – what thoughts do they have regarding the inventory, how was the shopping experience? Suggestions for the future.

Volunteers and faculty were asked to complete a survey, seeking their input and suggestions. The results of the responses are being tabulated. The committee will evaluate the results and make a report to the FVLC Board of Directors.

There is a strong desire that the club continue a special holiday experience at the school.

ZONE MEETING via ZOOM January 17, 2023

D. Nellor Meeting Facilitator PZC Helen Sutfin called the meeting to order at 6:30pm.

PZC Helen Sutfin introduced guest speaker Jodi Blackwood, Clark Regional Emergency Services Agency (CRESA) Volunteer Manager Coordinator.

The first CRESA training session will be Saturday, February 25 from 12:30pm until 3:30pm at CRESA headquarters. Check emails for sign-up information.

CRESA handles 911 dispatches, sends out emergency alerts, organizes and supervises search and rescue operations, provides public education on emergency preparedness, works with ham radio in the event that regular communications lines are inoperable, supports the community during a national disaster.

There are 1,000 CRESA volunteers in Clark County. They look for missing people, help in evidence recovery, assist medical staff, do license plate patrols, and help with events at parks.

The meeting on February 25 will include a conversation as to what Lions would like to do. The emergency readiness program will be explained in detail. Following the initial meeting there will be an "I M Reddy" class. It will be a full day training. It will include hands-on CPR, building a personal emergency readiness kit, psychology of trauma and how to cope, and mental preparedness for emergency situations.

Starting in late March there will be a 25 hour training including how to use a fire extinguisher, search and rescue practices, EMT assistance, how to prepare for and get through a disaster, and how to help family and neighbors during a disaster.

At any time there are 100 emergency responders on alert to help the 500,000 people in Clark County during an emergency.

The #1 emergency in this area is probably wildfire. Other possible emergencies may deal with tornados, flooding, snowstorms, heavy rain, power outages, volcanoes, and heavy traffic. The Nakia Creek fire in October was the first time an evacuation was called for.

PZC Helen will send out the email registration form. (Update – she has sent it. Pass it on to others who are interested. Participants do not have to be Lions; they do have to be at least 18 years old.)

DG Debbie said the membership goal for the 2022-2023 Lion year for District G is +20 members.

As of the end of December we have lost members. GMC PDG Mark M. reminded everyone of the many learning opportunities offered online by LCI.

Ridgefield President Don reported that COVID actually brought new members into the Ridgefield Lions Club. They couple a membership drive with a club special event. They are always at community events. They work hard but are planning to have more fun – maybe recognize club members in a fun fashion.

Salmon Creek has added three members in the last two months. It's important to get prospects involved in the club. It's important to have fun. Speakers keep the meetings interesting. Their membership plan includes keeping a log of prospective members and reaching out to those prospects to find out what their interests are.

Vancouver has several new members. The basis is finding out what people like to do.

Battle Ground reported that fun and friendship are important. And don't do too many funky old Lion things. Peninsula has been following Stephanie's program suggestions. Make sure your club is ready for new members. What can Lions do for you? They have promoted Lions on Facebook.

Camas partners with other organizations. Puyallup Valley is slowly growing.

DG Debbie announced that Allan Snider will be the guest speaker at the Spring Conference. There will be a Leader Dog presentation. Spring Conference will be May 12-13 at the Heathman. Get your Superhero gear out!

Ridgefield is working the ilani Brewfest February 17, 18,19. Sign-up forms have been sent to club secretaries to be passed on to club members. This is a great opportunity to earn funds for your club.

Fort Vancouver president Cheri Perry has volunteered to facilitate the February 21 Zone Council meeting.

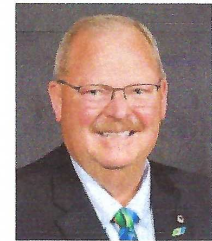

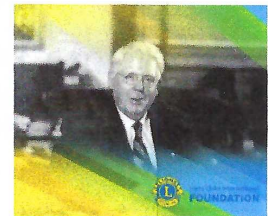

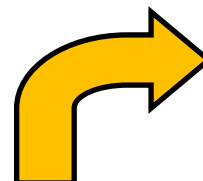
