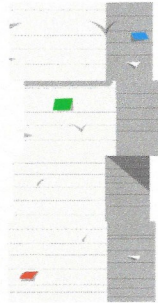

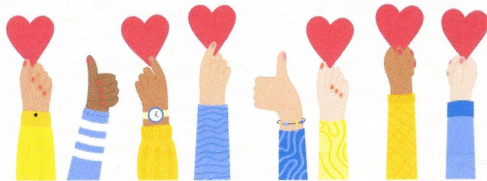
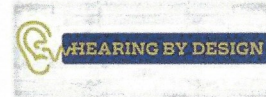

Preparedness

NOW WHAT MARTHA!

Now you need to decide where to put the stuff you're accumulating for a disaster..... hum.....In case you've misunderstood, just watch the news. Hopefully you've gotten started on your Bug Out kit (check March newsletter), which by the way is a military term that means to leave in a hurry. Your Bug-Out kit/backpack/small suitcase on wheels can go in the 1)end of your closet, 2) in the hall closet where you keep the vacuum cleaner, 3) back of your car, 4) inside your garage, 5) or under your bed. Anyplace that is convenient and cool, dark but easy to get to.

Assignment:

If you haven't started that kit, start today and at least get a small suitcase, backpack, or athletic bag and put 1 bottle of water and a pair of socks in it. Three days from now add 2 candy bars, underwear, spare meds, spare eye-glasses, poncho purchased from the store still in the packaging, and 1 flashlight with extra batteries.

Storage in case of disaster.

The perfect place would be empty shelves in your garage (if you have a garage). Cabinets in your shop, if you have a shop, or laundry room space.

Here's what I did. I bought a cabinet kit of particle board that had shelves and doors. I assembled it – took a whole day- painted it dark green and it's in my garage. It has some food items, paper goods and fabric. I figure the fabric might be for "bartering". Just kidding. I'll probably have to mop up floors and sleep on it in a true disaster.

Then I bought at a second-hand store a wooden open shelf unit that is huge. It's not as heavy as the cabinet but works just fine. I have food items that my husband and I will eat on shelves by category: fruits, vegetables, soups, pasta, lots of peanut butter, canned tuna and chicken, and other food items.

I have a shelf of cleaning products- you will need more than you think- plastic bags, baking soda, salt, and lots of vinegar (look up vinegar and you will see it's many uses).

I have bars of soap, laundry soap, Dawn, a bag of rags, medium and large trash bags., etc.

When you get to sanitary needs- you will need A LOT!

We will talk about water next time.

Assignment: Do something. Get your Bug Out bag together. Think about shelving.

Lloyd Lions losing charter for inducting women

When the 15-man Lloyd Lions Club inducted the first of several women members in June, it hardly seemed an earth-shaking deed.

After years of male solitude and declining membership, it was perhaps understandable when the men tired of stale company at bleary-eyed 7 a.m. breakfast meetings in the Village Pancake House every Thursday.

But the heretofore all-male International Association of Lions Clubs roared its disapproval Wednesday with the announcement that the Lloyd Lions were being stripped from the ranks of some 1.4 million brother Lions in 152 countries around the world.

From his office in Oak Brook, Ill., Joseph D. Stone, general counsel of the association, said he would be mailing letters Wednesday informing the Lloyd Lions that their 21-year-old charter was canceled for violating a ban on women members.

The cancellation decision was made by unanimous vote of the international Lions board at a meeting Oct. 5 in Kyoto, Japan, Stone said.

Reached in Taiwan late last week, Stone had refused comment to The Oregonian, saying a formal statement would be withheld until Wednesday.

Robert Blank, a real estate agent and president of the Lloyd Lions, said Wednesday he had not been informed of the decision.

we will be doing that." A suit might challenge the legality of the association's constitution barring women members, Blank said.

The association's 64-year-old constitution states "any male person of legal majority and of good moral character and of good reputation in his community may be granted membership in any duly authorized Lions Club." Women are not mentioned.

Stone said last week's international board resolution ousting the Lloyd Lions marked the second time a local chapter's charter had been revoked for admitting women. The Century City chapter in Los Angeles was barred in March 1975 and no longer exists, he said.

Stone said the club had failed to respond to two letters warning of possible action by the international board. Blank, however, said responses were sent.

Norma Paulus, Oregon's secretary of state, who became an honorary member of the Lloyd Lions last week, said she was disappointed. Ms. Paulus, who said she prides herself on being the "only woman in a lot of male things," said she joined the club although several Oregon Lions' officials asked her to back out.

"I think it would have been an insult for me to say no," she said.


The other three women, who are among the 18 active members of the club, are Mary Mulflur, a real estate agent for Barry Menashe Realtors; Helen Greenough, a community technical assistance manager for the Port of Portland; and Nancy Hopper, an equal employment opportunity officer for the federal Bureau of Land Management.

Ms. Mulflur, a former standout amateur golfer who describes herself as "not much of a feminist," became the first woman member in June after being approached by Blank, who manages the real estate office where she works.

"I don't think it was a women's or feminist issue," she said. "I wanted to make a contribution to help somebody."

Blank said the Lloyd Lions voted last month to continue even without a charter. Current club projects include taking senior citizens on outings and providing food for the needy.

Blank said the idea of admitting women was broached by Joseph E. Weston, a prominent Portland real estate agent, as a way to stem dropping membership.



Lloyd club to rejoin Lions' pride after 7-year ouster

Group to regain charter after long legal skirmish over admitting women

A roar of approval will rattle the timbers in a North Portland Lions' den Friday evening.

Seven years after the Lloyd Lions Club of Portland defied Lions International rules by admitting women, the local club is being welcomed back into the pride.

At a banquet at the Red Lion Inn/Coliseum, the club will regain its original charter. It is being reinstated as of the date the 21-year-old document was revoked in October 1981,

and all who were members at that time also are being reinstated.

Lions International, based in Oak Brook, Ill., has even sent 20- and 25-year pins for presentation to members of Lloyd Lions who had earned them but had been denied them during the time the club was not recognized.

"It was a battle we didn't really want. But it resulted in strong bonds between us, and now to get our charter back makes me feel great," said Ron Horne, Lloyd Lions president.

Horne had been a member only a few weeks when the issue of admitting women came up and he voted in favor of the idea. "There were opponents, but only one person left us at the time because of the vote," Horne said Tuesday.

"I don't know why it has taken the international so long to reverse its action. Everybody saw what eventually had to happen.

When it was brought to the international forum conference two years ago, it was a tight vote and (women membership) was killed by the Southern states. Last year, it came to the floor again, and this time the vote was to admit women, spurred no doubt by the U.S. Supreme Court's decision regarding Rotary."

The court ruled that states may force organizations of business and professional executives to admit women, and Rotary, followed by Kiwanis, began accepting them.

Horne said that since the Lions International vote the number of clubs taking in women had grown at an astronomical rate. Some rural clubs are doubling their membership by admitting women.

After Lions International revoked the Lloyd club's charter, the club filed suit. The club's right to admit women was affirmed by decisions at the circuit court and state supreme court levels in 1985 and 1987, respectively, and

it was awarded punitive damages of \$4,500.

Of that amount, \$1,500 was awarded to each of the two plaintiffs in the action, Helen Greenough and Nancy Hopper, and \$1,500 to the club itself.

The club remained active even without its charter. It met weekly, sponsored speakers, raised funds and donated to traditional Lions charities. It also inducted numerous other women.

It now has nine women members. Topaz Faulkner, then a city planner for Milwaukie, became the club's first woman president in 1986-87.

At the banquet, sponsored by the Hollywood Lions Club, the Lloyd club's original charter sponsor, the \$4,500 damages award will be donated by the club and by the two women plaintiffs to the Oregon Sight and Hearing Foundation.

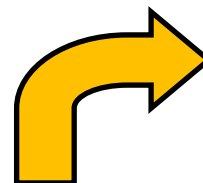
