On Thursday, November 30, several Fort Vancouver Lions including President Terry and Phyliss Robertson, Mike and Diane Cavanaugh along with David and Penny Rich attended the 100th Anniversary of the Longview Pioneer Lions Club with special quest Lions International President Patti Hill.

International President Patti is president of a consulting firm. With 30 years of experience as an educator and psycholo-

gist, she has mentored graduate students and psychologists in training. She has also championed the rights of children and youth who are deaf and/or blind.

A member of the Edmonton Host Lions Club since 1990, International President Hill has held many offices within the association, including district chairperson for Membership, Environment, Convention and International Cooperation and Understanding. Additionally, she has served as a committee member for the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum, multinational coordinator for Campaign Sight-First II, secretary for the Lions Eyebank (Alberta) Society, Vice President of the Lions Eye Research Institute of Northern Alberta and presenter at many



forums and conventions. Dr Hill is a founding member of the Lions of Canada Consultative Committee. In recognition of her service to the association, International President Hill has received numerous awards, including several International President's Awards. She has been honored with the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. She is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, and recipient of numerous other fellowships.

In addition to her Lions activities, International President Hill is active in numerous professional, human rights, and community organizations. In the past, she served as an executive officer of the Alberta Association of School Psychologists and the Association of Canadian Educators of the Hearing Impaired. International President Hill has also served on the Alberta Premier's Council on Persons with Disabilities.

Her theme is "Changing the World". Here's an old saying – It's the journey, not the destination. Changing the world is a journey. There's no middle and no end. There is, however, a beginning.



Our Red Kettle coordinators work hard to track daily Red Kettle donations and can share how much you and other ringers raised at a location! We want your donation of your priceless time to be as incredibly rewarding to you as an individual/group as it is to our programs and those we serve.

Christmas Caroling and Wacky Christmas Sweaters are some of the best parts of the holiday season. Nothing says, "It's Christmastime" like hearing people singing or playing their favorite holiday tunes or dressed in their favorite Christmas Sweater, Santa or Mrs. Clause, elf or reindeer costume.

9. Channel Your Competitive Side

It is easy to see your efforts are paying off as your Red Kettle begins to fill. Set a personal goal for such as: "how many people can I get to stop?" or a personal fundraising goal.

10. Be Part of a Legacy

The Salvation Army Red Kettle campaign has been a Christmas tradition since 1891. Salvation Army Captain Joseph McFee set out a kettle to raise funds to feed the hungry in San Francisco. Now, The Salvation Army and Red Kettles can be found all over the world.

In 1865, General William Booth founded the Salvation Army in London's notorious East End slums with a call to action for the more fortunate members of society as they celebrated the holiday season.

"William Booth was a Methodist lay preacher in the east end of London, which is an area that had a lot of poverty, a lot of recent immigrants, drunkards, prostitutes, and orphans, so William Booth began to go out and preach. He was kind of your typical soapbox preacher and he realized that there, it's hard to say, that there's a loving God out there when people are hungry and cold. So the concept came up of soup, souls and salvation," said Captain John Gantner of the Salvation Army Kroc Center.

The kettle collections started accidentally in San Francisco in 1891 when a local Salvation Army captain named Joseph McFee publicly promised to feed 1,000 destitute people near Fisherman's Wharf.

To raise the money needed, McFee found an old lobster pot and came up with the slogan "Keep the pot boiling." He then set up on the waterfront.

"He stepped forward and agreed to do something and had a bunch of people he needed to feed a Christmas dinner to and he wasn't sure exactly how he was going to do that. He basically put a lobster pot out there and began to collect money to help that year and he was able to meet his goal

in San Francisco," Gantner said.

The bell tradition began in 1900 with a teenage volunteer in New York City named Amelia Kunkel. She was apparently frustrated by the many bankers on Wall Street who walked by and ignored her.

Kunkel went to a nearby Woolworth's department store and bought a small bell for ten cents. The rest is history.

"There was a girl in New York who was 16 years old and that's when she started ringing the bell and that became the bell tradition and now the red kettle program. Lion David Rich

#### Fort Vancouver Lions Club & Foundation Board Meeting Friday, October 6, 2023 1:00 p.m. Golden Corral Restaurant

King Lion Terry called the meeting to order at 1:07 p.m.

**Board Members Present**: King Lion Terry, Phyllis Robertson, Rick Giles, Gay Enyeart, John Lyons, Michele Druschel, Sandy Conroy, Diane Cavanaugh, Mike Cavanaugh, Terry Sutfin, and Shelly Brown. Lions Helen Sutfin and Larry Brown were also present.

#### Standard Reports to the Board:

**Secretary's Report:** Lion Diane asked for a correction of the cost of the Director's and Officer's Liability Insurance from \$450 to \$400. Lion Rick made a motion to accept the minutes from the Sept. 8, 2023 Board Meeting as amended. Lion Phyllis seconded the motion. The motion was approved by the Board.

**Treasurer's Report:** Lion Diane sent out the Treasurer's reports to the Board prior to the meeting. She reported that we have paid for the insurance coverage for Officers and Directors for this year. She also shared that there is an abundance of insurance coverage for the storage shed. Lion Diane made a motion that Lion Allen Rhyasen be the second person with a key and pass to the storage shed. Lion John seconded the motion. The motion was approved by the Board.

Lion Rick made a motion to move the money from the Foundation Savings account to the Foundation Checking account, except for \$5.00 to keep the Savings account open. Lion Sandy seconded the motion. The motion was approved by the Board.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

**Santa Store:** Lion Michele and Lion Gay have planned for shopping for the gifts for the age groups that are lacking in gifts. The Santa Store is scheduled for Thursday, December 14, 2023.

**Christmas Party:** Lion Sandy has requested that 1-2 more people join the committee to help with planning. The Christmas party is scheduled for Wednesday, December 6, 2023.

**New Members and Name Tags:** Lion Diane offered to order the name tags for the new members.

**Lions Shirts:** Lion Helen shared that members would buy plain shirts and take them to the embroidery place on Mill Plain and have our club logo stitched on. Lion Sandy offered to take on the project of getting information about polos for consistency.

**White Cane Proclamation:** Lion Terry has requested that as many people as are available come to support this event. The meeting is Monday, October 9, 2023 at 6:30 p.m. at the Vancouver City Hall office.

**Second Vice President Position:** Lion Helen requested a list of the duties of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President. The main duty is to oversee Service. Lion Terry expressed his interest in continuing in this position.

**Observation Report:** The committee consisted of Lions Gay, Phyllis, and Diane (prior to Diane becoming the club Treasurer). This observation is for July 2022 - June 2023. The committee found that the checks for \$500+ were getting the two required signatures. The committee recommended closing the Pay Pal account since we have an account with TMC. There was no access to electronic records from July 2019 - June 2022, due to the change from QuickBooks to Quicken. Paper records were available from the credit union. The Arbaugh money transfer ended in 2022. Recommend funds be moved from the Savings account except for the minimum amount to keep the Savings account open. A yearly observation needs to happen, per our club policies. When a change in software happens, we need to give the Treasurer two months to make this change.

**Credit Card Fees:** During a discussion of the credit card processing fees we used to pay and are currently paying, it was decided that Lion Diane will investigate other options for credit card options and bring back detailed information at the next Board Meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:00 p.m.


