Meeting Bunny Tabatt: An Inspiring Encounter

When I was District Governor, I had the opportunity to meet Bunny Tabatt from Minnesota. She was a vibrant and witty lady with a wicked sense of humor, who was always on the go, giving freely of her time and talents. Bunny was a Lion who also traveled extensively, sharing information about the Leader Dog School. By the way, Bunny was blind, a detail that makes her dedication even more extraordinary.

**Bear: A Companion and Lifeline**

During the course of our conversation, I learned that Bunny had had her guide dog, Bear, for over nine years. Bear had made it possible for Bunny to stay committed to volunteering and helped restore her self-esteem and independence. A year earlier, Bear had been diagnosed with cancer, but after treatment, he recovered and was back on his feet. Then, just after July 4<sup>th</sup>, Bear was again diagnosed with cancer. At the time of our meeting, Bunny was waiting to learn if treatment would again be an option.

**Facing Heartbreak and Uncertainty**

"Sandy," Bunny confided, "I don't think I can go through this again if I have to put Bear down. He is not only necessary for my way of life; he has become part of my life. Why would I want to put myself in that situation again with another dog, knowing that eventually I would have to go through this again?"

**Love, Loss, and Commitment**

We then talked about many other things: family, travels, goals. Throughout the conversation, Bunny's hand was resting on Bear's head, unconsciously rubbing behind his ears. It was all I could do not to weep for this wonderful woman who so clearly loved her dog.

## Choosing Courage Over Comfort

After we had talked for a while, Bunny stopped mid-sentence and looked down, silent for a moment. Then, turning to me, she said, "I'm not a coward. How could I not get another dog? Not getting another dog would tremendously alter my life. Besides, I think Bear would be very disappointed in me." We held each other for a moment before it was time for me to get back on the bus.

## A Lasting Lesson

Bunny Tabatt will never know how much she affected me that day. She reminded me that doing things may not always be easy, but sometimes they are right. As Lions, we face similar challenges. How many times have we heard people say we shouldn't continue or start a project because "it's too hard"? Sometimes the step is huge and the failures hurt, but the success is so sweet! Maybe we should take a lesson from Bunny and Bear and just do the right thing.

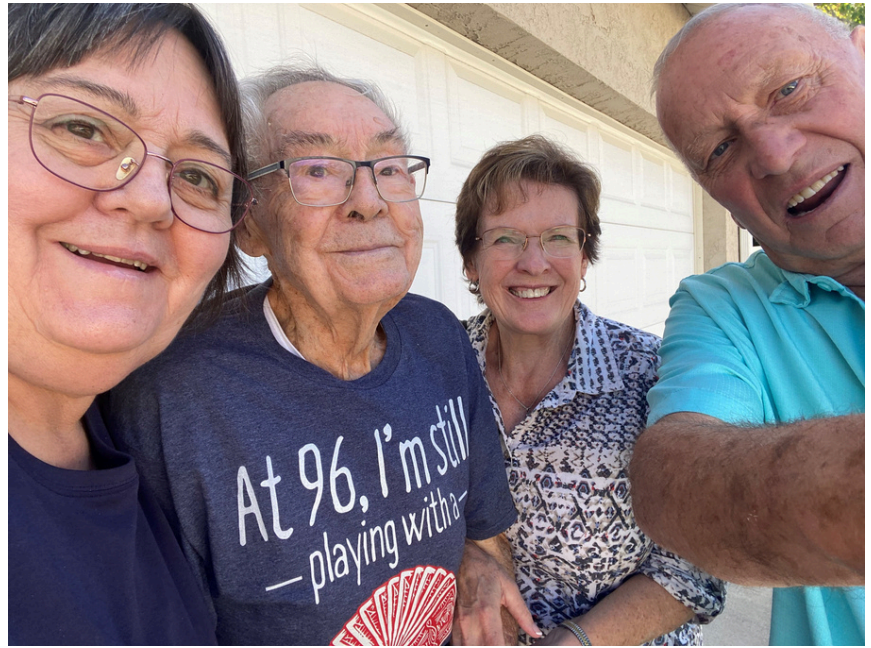

## **Marsel Tingey**

K. Marsel Tingey, 98, of Midvale, Utah, died in his sleep on April 20, 2026. Born January 17, 1928, in Woodruff, Utah, he was raised during the Great Depression, working alongside his family on their farm and ranch. He graduated from Springville High School in 1946 and soon enlisted in the U.S. Army, serving as a rifleman with the Fifth Cavalry Regiment in Japan during the post-World War II occupation.

Following his military service, Marsel served a two-year mission in Scotland for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, where he developed a lifelong appreciation for the people and culture. He later attended Brigham Young University, earning a degree in Agronomy and Botany, and married the love of his life, Joylene Rawle, in 1952.

Marsel built a long and meaningful career as a soil scientist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, with additional service at the Environmental Protection Agency. He eventually settled in Washington state, first in Bellevue, and then in Vancouver, where he served with the Fort Vancouver Lions for 28 years. He returned to Utah to live with his daughter in 2021.

A devoted husband, father, and mentor, Marsel loved farming, gardening, and teaching youth about soil and environmental stewardship. He is survived by his five children, 19 grandchildren, and 43 great-grandchildren, and is remembered for his life of service, faith, and dedication to family.

Funeral services will be held on Saturday, May 2, 2026, beginning at 10:00 a.m. Pacific Time at the LDS chapel in Midvale, Utah. His dear friend Allen Rhyasen will provide a remembrance. ## Fort Vancouver Lions Club Meetings - February 20, 2026 Golden Corral, 11801 NE Fourth Plain Blvd, Vancouver, WA 98682

At the February 6<sup>th</sup> meeting, International Director Mark Mansell and his partner in service, Debbie, joined via Zoom to discuss the proposal to increase LCI dues by \$2/year for 5 years starting in 2028. Lion Mark first addressed the potential impact on membership. He indicated the board had compared dues for our association compared to other organizations like us, specifically Kiwanis and Rotary, both of which are currently \$57 more than our \$50 LCI dues. He pointed out that costs are going up, and LCI has been constantly looking at cost savings and adjusting expenses. LCI is also attempting to spread this out, trying to make it as soft an impact as possible. If it's not approved at the International Convention in Hong Kong, it will have to be looked at again; there just has to be a cost increase at some point. Our dues support the staff of roughly 300 between LCIF and LCI, which in Lion Mark's opinion, is pretty lean for an organization our size. In answer to the question of Why should I pay to volunteer? Mark said our association is funded completely by us as members, unlike organizations such as Salvation Army, or Red Cross, or United Way, which use a portion of the donations they receive for their Administrative costs. Mark also reminded us that every club has access to a variety of resources, from training to legal.

On February 20<sup>th</sup>, FVLC member Dave Hutson gave a presentation on the importance of emergency preparedness. He highlighted the Lions ALERT Program, a standardized framework designed to help Lions prepare for and respond to natural, man-made, and healthcare emergencies. The upcoming I AM REDDI training (March 7<sup>th</sup>) will hopefully be a first step towards a network of Clark county Lions that will be ready to partner with local authorities to be mobilized quickly during a crisis.

### Secretary/Treasure Report

- Motion to approve minutes by Sandy, second by Phyllis.
- Our Vanguard account has transitioned to a new type, which requires new paperwork and documentation to access.
- Review of Dues: in 2025-2026, LCI \$50, MD19 \$26.60, FVLC \$13.40 total \$90
  - Last dues increase was from \$75 to \$90 in 2021
  - It was suggested to compare our dues with Camas and Ridgefield before deciding whether to increase dues for 2026-2027.

### Ongoing business

- Board/Club retreat – David Rich has helped Sandy with planning.

Diane will join Lori and Phyllis on a committee to keep this idea moving forward.
- Possibility of converting to the free Lions e-Clubhouse for our website – Diane reported that Dotty has encouraged the exploration of this, as she has become less available and believes that having several people who can update the site is a good thing. Diane has set up the site and will demo it to the board in March and the club in April or May.


